## CHAPTER 20: IC / PROSTATITIS / CPPS

## | INTERSTITIAL CYSTITIS (IC) |

- Diagnosis of exclusion in patients that present with urinary frequency, urgency, and pelvic pain
  - o Allodynia = non-painful stimuli perceived as painful
  - Hyperalgesia = abnormal heightened sensitivity to painful stimuli
  - May have a decreased bladder capacity (determined under anesthesia)

Interstitial cystitis: patients void to avoid/limit pain

Overactive bladder: patients void to avoid/limit incontinence

- <u>Histology</u>: non-specific findings (i.e. clinical diagnosis), such as mast cell infiltration due to inflammation
  - o Glycosaminoglycan layer disruption
- Originally thought to be exclusively a bladder disorder; however, recent data suggests majority of patients with "interstitial cystitis" actually have a multisystem disorder called chronic pelvic pain syndrome (CPPS)
- · Considered to have two types:
  - o Ulcerative type (~ 10-15%): urothelial Hunner's ulcerations
